Theme: "What Is The True Meaning Of Christmas"

My Fellow Citizens and Residents of Dominica,

As President of the Commonwealth of Dominica, I am elated to again address you at Christmas. Christmas is undoubtedly one of the most uplifting events on both the religious and secular calendars in Dominica due to its profound significance. However, it is interesting to note how secularization is gradually diminishing the Christian essence of Christmas; and so this year I will address you on "What is the true meaning of Christmas".

Luke 2:10-11 of the King James Version of the Bible states" And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people.

"For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord."

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas with all its lights, music, and festivities, we are reminded of the deep, eternal significance of this day. Christmas is so much more than presents and parties, so much more than just a season of cheer. At its core, Christmas is the

celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ—God coming to dwell among us, bringing salvation and hope to all of humanity.

But what is the true meaning of Christmas? Why do we celebrate this momentous occasion year after year? Let's reflect on the profound truths of Christmas, and in doing so, discover why it continues to be a source of great joy and hope for believers.

The celebration of Christmas reveals the Fulfillment of God's Promise to mankind. From the beginning of time, God promised to send a Savior to redeem the world.
